School Information:

Contextual Information:

Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Primary is a co-educational school catering for children from Kindergarten (4 year olds) to Year 6 (11 year olds). Being a Catholic school, Religious Education is an integral part of our programme and is part of the daily life of the school. The school provides education in the following learning areas as aligned with our Western Australian Curriculum: English, Mathematics, History, Science, Geography, the Arts, Health & Physical Education, as well as Society & the Environment and Technology & Enterprise.

We have specialist teachers in Music, Science, Visual Arts and Physical Education. We currently have two Reading Recovery teachers who provide support for students who need extra assistance with literacy and an EMU (Extending Mathematical Understanding) support teacher who provides assistance to those students needing extra support with their numeracy skills. The EMU Numeracy program support students in the school who are having difficulty with mathematical concepts. Teachers have extensive strategies at their disposal within the program to specifically cater and meet the individual needs of students in numeracy. Our Lady of Mercy also offers specialised programs in Mathletics (Years 4-7) and Lexile Reading to support classroom literacy and numeracy. The school initiated the Bluearth Program in 2010, which has made significant in roads in the physical, spiritual and emotional development of the students.

We pride ourselves in having a staff dedicated to catering for the development of the whole child, that being their intellectual, social, emotional, physical and of course spiritual development.
